

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CMS Graduation Rate Hits New High



Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools' high school graduation rate hit its highest mark ever in 2014, and the gap between white and minority students continued to decrease.

According the district, the graduation rate hit 85.2 percent this year, up from 81 percent in 2013. This is the fifth year in a row of increases. More than half of the district's high schools have a graduation rate above 90 percent.



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Common Core Debate Intensifies

North Carolina is among a growing list of states that have decided to reexamine the Common Core State Standards amid concerns from some teachers and backlash from policymakers. The renewed debate about the math and reading guidelines also comes as more Americans learn about Common Core. Last year, only two-thirds of people surveyed were aware of Common Core. This summer, more than 80 percent of Americans polled know about Common Core.

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Judge Rules N.C. Voucher Program Unconstitutional

A Raleigh judge has ordered an immediate halt to North Carolina's "Opportunity Scholarship" program, which would give taxpayer dollars to low-income families to use at private and religious schools. Judge Robert Hobgood declared the program unconstitutional and blocked the state from distributing \$4,200 vouchers to families this summer. Hobgood said it is illegal to use taxpayer dollars for private school tuition. Supporters of the program have appealed the order. Meanwhile, the North Carolina Supreme Court has rejected a request from legislative leaders for an emergency release of the voucher dollars during the appeal process.
