"We must accept finite disappointment, but never lose infinite hope."*

The civil rights battles of 50 years ago teach us that we must not become discouraged. Together, we can make progress.

Dr. King said, "We must demonstrate, teach and preach until the very foundations of our nation are shaken." Demand justice, teach people the new voting rules, create a voter action ministry for your congregation!

Five changes in NC's election rules that affect you:

- **1.** No Photo ID in 2015. Poll officials will ask if you have a photo ID, but you don't need to show it until 2016. Even in 2016, curbside voters with a disability and voters using a mail-in ballot will not need a photo ID.
- **2.** No straight-party voting: Voters must mark their choice in each race on the ballot.
- **3.** Early voting is cut from 17 to 10 days.
- **4.** No late registration. You must be registered at your current address at least 25 days before Election Day. You must update your registration if you move.
- **5.** No out-of-precinct voting on Election Day. You can vote at a central location during early voting, but on Election Day, you must go to your own precinct's polling place.



Lessons from 50 Years Ago



The Voting Rights Act of 1965 became law in response to the persistent organizing and sacrifice of non-violent freedom fighters across the South. The galvanizing moment occurred in Selma, Alabama, on "Bloody Sunday," March 7, 1965, when Alabama state troopers

viciously attacked 500 marchers with clubs and tear gas.

The marchers were protesting the harassment of African Americans trying to register to vote and the police murder of Jimmie Lee Jackson after a vigil. Pictures of "Bloody Sunday," broadcast around the world, spurred Congress to adopt the Voting Rights Act against discriminatory practices that block voting. It became a powerful tool for justice.

In 2013, the US Supreme Court overturned part of the Voting Rights Act – and the NC legislature immediately adopted a host of new voting restrictions. Fifty years after the VRA passed, we can and we must mount new campaigns to "make real the promise of democracy," as We the People have done in the past.

The Moral March for Love & Justice: February 14, 2015

On Valentine's Day, thousands of North Carolinians will march for voting rights, economic justice, good schools, equal justice, quality health care, and more. These are the goals of the Historic Thousands on Jones Street (H K on J) coalition, led by Rev. William J. Barber II and the NC NAACP.

Gather at 9:00 am, Feb. 14, at Shaw University (corner of Wilmington and South St.) and march to the legislature, 16 W. Jones St., Raleigh. The event lasts a couple of hours, but the work for justice is year round. Be a part of the Forward Together movement!
