

Dear Steve.

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Last week, Gov. Pat McCrory unveiled his biennial budget proposal, which calls for more money for PreK-12 education, including some for teacher raises. While we are still very early in the budgeting process, the governor's proposal does ir several strong provisions upon which the General Assembly can build.

Gov. McCrory calls for spending money to raise teacher salaries, particularly for beginning teachers, a promise he made year ago. About 35 percent of North Carolina teachers would see a raise under the governor's budget. In a tight budget this is a step in the right direction, especially on top of the raises lawmakers approved a year ago. But our state needs t continue to work toward the national average teacher salary and value teachers, at all levels of their careers.

His plan also includes full funding for the projected growth in public school students over the next two school years. Previously, enrollment growth was automatically included in the continuation budget, essentially "baked-in" to the proce before it began. Now, funding for enrollment growth is part of the expansion budget, meaning lawmakers can choose to it, but aren't bound to do so as in previous budgets.

MeckEd is troubled by this change, and we are pleased that the governor's budget fully funds enrollment growth. His proposal includes more than \$100 million to pay for 678 new teaching positions next school year, necessitated by a proj increase of 17,333 students in our public school classrooms. Properly funding this growth will keep qualified educators i of students, and will help keep class size down. We encourage the House and Senate to fully fund enrollment growth in budgets when the time comes.

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About 35 percent of North Carolina teachers would receive a raise under Gov. Pat McCrory's <u>budget</u>, according to an <u>analysis</u> from the N.C. Department of Public Instruction. The budget, which McCrory unveiled last week, called for increasing the starting salary for beginning teachers to \$35,000, fulfilling a promise McCrory made last year. Other teachers would receive raises to move up on the salary schedule adopted last year. McCrory's budget spends an additional \$235 million on public education.

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## McCrory's Budget Includes Enrollment Growth Funding



The budget Gov. Pat McCrory introduced last week included funding for enrollment growth, something that, for the first time since the 1930s, was not guaranteed from the start. McCrory's budget calls for more than \$100 million in 2015-16 to pay for 678 new teacher positions in the upcoming school year. Those teachers are necessary because of an increase in what's known as the "average daily membership" in North Carolina public schools. McCrory's budget projects an increase of 17,333 students for the 2015-16 school year.

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
