

YMS was the only year to date that lottery funds have been allocated to fund teacher sesistant pay, in fiscal year 2014, \$1,553,405 in lottery funds were allocated to Mecklenburg County for digital learning initiatives. For fiscal year 2013, \$1,533,835 in lottery funds were allocated to Mecklenburg County to partially offset how much state funding a local education agency had to return to the state.
