*** Session One, March 8 - The Unavoidable Burden of our Neighbors**

Darren Ash, former director of Charlotte Family Housing, and Laura Belcher, CEO of Habitat Charlotte, will talk about predatory lending, the importance of education and issues surrounding housing and mobility. Darren now leads a financial education and lending nonprofit for low-wage families.

*** Session Two, March 15 - The Underbelly of Growth and Development**

Greg Jarrell, director of QC Family Tree; Julie Porter of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Housing Partnership; and Mack McDonald, CEO of Renaissance West will talk about the impact of gentrification on our neighborhoods and how the lack of affordable housing threatens the health of real people.
