Reading proficiency at third grade is critical for school, career and life success. Children struggling with reading HEAR WHAT PARENTS ARE in third grade are four times more likely to end up dropping out of high school.

Sixty percent of Charlotte's third graders are not reading at grade level.

"Together, we can make a significant change in our community. Charlotte can be the first major city in the country to have a majority of our third graders reading

on grade level. It's inspiring to see how many people are READ CHARLOTTE IN THE committing to this. We want to lift them up for the strides they are making," said Richardson.

Reading Heroes will be selected year round through a nomination process on the Read Charlotte website. Charlotte-Mecklenburg residents are asked to go online and complete the short form to explain how their nominee is making a difference (when it comes to literacy) in the lives of young kids across the county from birth through third grade.

Those selected receive a special Reading Hero t-shirt, recognition letter and digital badge to share on social media. Many heroes will also be featured on Read Charlotte's website, annual report, newsletter and social media channels.
