have it any other way. It's an incredible opportunity to celebrate our successes and learn about innovations in research from the experts in their field. This year we were lucky to have Ned Sharpless, M.D, Director of the National Cancer Institute as a Keynote Speaker.

Lights of Hope History

- LIGHTS of HOPE began in 2011 at the National Leadership Summit and Lobby Day. That year 1,200 bags lined the Capitol's Reflecting pool celebrating ACS CAN's 10th anniversary.
- In 2012, 7,000 Lights of Hope bags lit up the Capitol in honor of cancer patients, survivors, and loved ones lost across the U.S.
- 2013 gave way to a record 14,000 Lights of Hope and during the ceremony ACS CAN honored the American Cancer Society's 100th year with a birthday cake recognizing the many accomplishments achieved together.



• 2015 marked the 5th Anniversary of Lights of HOPE, featuring a display of 20,000 lights. Even though it was a very

rainy event, hundreds braved the elements to honor and celebrate friends and loved ones.

• In 2017, the location changed to the steps in front of the historic Lincoln Memorial, displaying over 25,000 Lights of Hope around the Washington Monument Reflecting Pool.

The Reason Why Tariffs Don't Work

So, Mr. Trump has imposed tariffs. When I heard this, I did a face palm. In my mind, placing additional taxes on imports is the bane of free trade. I get it. I really do.

Increasing the price of imports, by placing a tax on them, is supposed to provide an incentive for consumers to buy American made products. But, the problem is the retaliatory nature of tariffs. Let's look at an historical example, provided by Aaron Miller, in an online article in "The Republic."

To bolster the U.S. economy during the Great Depression, Congress passed the Smoot-Hawley Tariff Act after the stock market crash of 1929. The legislation increased tariffs on farm products and manufactured goods. Many economists at the time feared the impact of the new tariffs. Despite his own concerns, President Herbert Hoover approved the increased tariffs. Other nations countered by

raising tariffs on American goods, bringing international trade to a standstill. Unemployment increased, making the Great Depression much worse (Aaron Miller).

So, why do we need international trade?

International trade is good for the world. Therefore, you can drive a Japanese car while living in America. If companies can trade internationally, then they must compete with any other company on the global market. The increased competition forces companies



to make goods which people demand and are willing to purchase. This means that companies must make better quality goods, or at the very least, cheaper goods. The desire to stay competitive also forces companies to innovate. The fact that companies must produce cheaper and better goods increases the choices available in a market. If I am forced to buy American, because foreign goods are made prohibitively expensive to purchase, then this reduces my selection.

Really, when you think about it, people simply want to buy the cheapest and best quality products. This is how Japanese cars became popular in the early 1980's. The Japanese took a product which they did not invent, the automobile, and perfected it. Because of this, many Americans started buying Japanese cars and continue to do so until this very day.



This argument is different than the argument to protect American intellectual property. I am not taking about cheap knock offs. I am talking about having the ability to make a rational choice of which product to purchase due to its price and quality, rather than being forced to buy a particular product because it has been made artificially cheaper through tariffs.
