
Log Off

# In one West End community, residents hope 'historic' designation can stave off gentrification

After three years of work, Oaklawn Park is nearing its goal of becoming Charlotte's seventh locally recognized historic district, and the only one in the Historic West End.

Supporters hope the label will prevent the construction of ultra-modern, high-priced homes that would drive up real estate tax rates, displacing long-time residents. Others, however, fear the designation may trigger a similar effect.



If approved by City Council, Oaklawn Park would join Fourth Ward, Dilworth, Hermitage Court in Myers Park, Wesley Heights, Wilmore, and Plaza Midwood as historic districts.

## **Booker T. mural paints large the legacy of Washington Heights**

A new mural installed at Booker Street and Beatties Ford Road safeguards the history of Washington Heights in bold and welcoming colors.

Commissioned by the Washington Heights Neighborhood Association, the mural features an abstract portrait of Booker T. Washington.



"I think it matters that this mural was commissioned by a Black organization and created by a Black artist to signal the vitality of a Black neighborhood," artist Georgie Nakima told Westside Connect. "This isn't art to make someone from outside of the community feel 'safe.' It's a statement that reflects our stories and marks out our territory as deserving of respect."
