Message from the County Manager

There are several updates to report as Mecklenburg County continues to fight the COVID-19 virus.

As of 9 a.m., there were 6,367 cases of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) with 123 deaths due to COVID-19 reported among Mecklenburg County residents. Click [here](#) for the latest data report.

As the County continues to work toward reducing the number of new infections, Mecklenburg County is also beginning to look for ways to serve the needs of the community in the days following the pandemic.

This week the Board of County Commissioners adopted a resolution to establish the COVID-19 Recovery and Renewal Task Force. The goal of the task force is to examine how Mecklenburg County is addressing some of the many disparities this crisis has brought to light, including eliminating health disparities, mental health, housing, food security human services, childcare and several other issues.

The Task Force will be comprised of 23 members who will work on this assignment for one year. Applications for those positions are being accepted now. Click [here](#) to learn more about the task force and to apply. Final appointments will be made on July 7.

Meanwhile, the Business Leaders Roundtable continues to focus on marketing efforts to help keep the community safe. Roundtable Leaders are working with Center City Partners, Wray Ward and other marketing companies in the County to launch marketing materials for the community and specific marketing materials for the Latino community as we continue to try to educate the public on the various things they can do to help stop the spread of the virus.

Office of the Tax Collector to Publish Delinquent Taxpayers in the Charlotte Observer

On Sunday, June 28, the [Office of the Tax Collector](#) (OTC) will advertise approximately 30,000 Mecklenburg County property owners who have not paid their 2019 real and personal property tax bills in *The Charlotte Observer* as required by state law.

The purpose of the advertisement is to notify taxpayers of their 2019 tax obligation and includes the name of the owner, the property location, and the principle amount owed. Bills paid after May 8 may be included in the advertisement.

North Carolina General Statute 105-369 expressly requires the Tax Collector to advertise delinquent tax liens each year between March 1 and June 30. The previously planned advertisement on April 5 was delayed in response to the COVID-19 state of emergency.
