

Conducted from Aug. 9 to 12, the key findings include:

- Most students—led by college women and Democrats—say they are "absolutely certain" they will vote this year.
- Just over half of college students plan to vote by mail, with large partisan splits.
- Students have concerns about the legitimacy of the 2020 election, and many will doubt the outcome.
- Students plan to vote for Joe Biden by wide margin, but enthusiasm is low for both major candidates and their parties.
- Students see COVID-19 as the main issue facing the United States.

The report's data reveal a polarized student body that's unified in its skepticism of the electoral system, both candidates, and the idea that the government works to improve their lives. But most of them are still largely intent on casting a ballot in 2020.
