Lt. Spencer Cochran of CMPD is leaving to take a high-profile job with the department in Richmond, Va. Cochran has spent his entire 32 years with CMPD assigned to the west Charlotte division, which includes Beatties Ford Road.

In Richmond, Cochran will focus on special projects and issues related to community engagement. He will report to the city's newly hired police chief, Gerald Smith, who resigned from CMPD as a deputy chief in June to accept the top law-enforcement post in Richmond.

Laurene's Cafeteria opened its doors on Aug. 1, about seven years after an earlier effort failed. The restaurant is located at 1821 Bishop Madison Lane — about 3.2 miles from Hornets Nest Park, an ideal spot to enjoy takeout.

Wi-Fi access for remote learning: About 16,000 CMS students lack a good online connection, and school officials are struggling to get hotspots to them, <u>WFAE</u> reports.
