Our school is known for the personalization of learning, our hands on activities and organizations, and building authentic relationships with students and parents. Moving to virtual learning has indeed impeded our abilities to make personal connections. We have had to be intentional in our activities to ensure that we are still getting to know all of our students and making sure that all students still feel seen, heard, and deeply known. I have had to find different ways for my teachers to engage students, check for understanding, and ultimately improve their technological literacy.

In what ways has PG supported you in this shift too remote learning? What has worked and what hasn't?

PG has provided a network of school leaders and teachers who are all experiencing this shift. We have created a network where we have been able to share resources with one another like synchronous vs. asynchronous instruction schedules, information on creating Bitmojis, and resources on making instruction engaging for students. We are still finding ways to continue supporting each other although we all
