More COVID-19 News

- <u>An additional \$35 million in federal grants is being provided to help child care programs</u> providing in-person care throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.
- <u>The U.S. Department of Agriculture extended COVID-19 flexibilities for the Special</u> <u>Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC).</u>
- NCDHHS has released updated guidance and new resources to support educators, school staff and administrators as more schools open up for in-person instruction under Plan A (K -5 only) and Plan B. See all school-related public health guidance and resources.

COVID-19 Testing

Anyone who has symptoms of COVID-19 should get tested. If you are sick, use the Check My Symptoms tool to help you determine if you need a COVID-19 test. People who do not currently have symptoms but may have been exposed to COVID-19 should also get tested, especially people from historically marginalized communities, including Latinx/Hispanic, Black/African American and American Indian populations, who have been disproportionately affected by the virus.

North Carolina has upcoming community testing events scheduled in Alamance, Bertie, Brunswick, Chatham, Cumberland, Davidson, Duplin, Durham, Edgecombe, Forsyth, Gaston, Guilford, Harnett, Hertford, Iredell, Johnston, Lee, Lenoir, Mecklenburg, Onslow, Orange, Randolph, Robeson and Wake counties. COVID-19 testing is also provided at some local health departments, doctor and clinician offices, hospitals and clinics, many pharmacy sites and retail outlets, and other community locations. Some people who work in long-term care facilities and other high-risk settings may be tested through their work. You can find testing sites by using the Find My Testing Place tool online.
