

Taking the Vaccine: Why Black People have Trust Issues with American Medicine By Tarik Kiley December 24th, 2020



So, the COVID-19 vaccine is out and in the process of being distributed. This is fundamentally a good thing. Maybe, when we all get vaccinated, we can return to a normal

social life? I truly hope that we can beat this virus. But, at the same time I have heard skepticism from some people. They do not trust



the vaccine. Why wouldn't everyone want to take the vaccine? I know I want to take the vaccine. Well, some have pointed out the history of racism in American medicine. And, when I think about it, I can remember from history class as a child, learning about

the **Tuskegee Syphilis Study** that involved African Americans.

But the worst part of racism in medicine was the medical philosophy called eugenics. According to History.com, "Eugenics [was] the practice or advocacy of improving the human species by selectively mating people

with specific desirable hereditary traits. It aims[ed] to reduce human suffering by "breeding out" disease, disabilities, and socalled undesirable characteristics from the human population.

Early supporters of eugenics believed people inherited mental illness, criminal tendencies and even poverty, and that these conditions could be bred out of the gene pool." This medical philosophy was particularly dangerous, in that certain genetic traits were considered more desirable than others. So, for racists the hope and goal were to breed out other races. This was the case with Adolph Hitler's concept of the master race—breeding out non-

Aryans from the gene pool.

Of course, this was a horrendous idea. And I speak of eugenics in the past tense because the hope is that this type of medical racism is no longer accepted, and that no one



would seriously consider genetic engineering as a viable concept.

Approximately half of President-elect Joe Biden's transition team



consist of people of color. Forty-six percent of the transition staff are people of color with forty-one percent of the senior staff being people of color, according to CNN. This fact, in addition to the fact that he chose Kamala Harris, who is Black and South Asian, to be his running mate as Vice-President demonstrates a significant move in political philosophy

away from the racism of former President Donald Trump.

Still, some of us are afraid of being guinea pigs. The fear is that there is some sort of catch, and that White doctors may not mean well. I do not know whether that is true or not, but I understand

the fear. As aforementioned, the <u>Tuskegee Syphilis Study</u> is a poignant example of this fear of medical racism. This study was particularly egregious and unethical because there was no informed consent for the study.

Still, while there is understandable fear regarding the COVID-19 vaccine, perhaps it will ease minds to know that a Black woman is instrumental in its development?

ABC 7 Eyewitness News, notes that Dr. Kizzmekia Corbett, a



research fellow and scientific lead at the National Institute of Health, is on the frontlines working with a team of scientists, studying Moderna's vaccine, one of the two COVID-19 vaccines shown to be effective by more than 90 percent." So, if we do not trust White medical doctors because of past medical

racism, perhaps Dr. Corbett's involvement is evidence of a new era? We can only wait and see.


