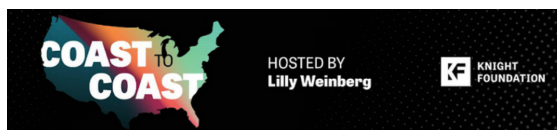

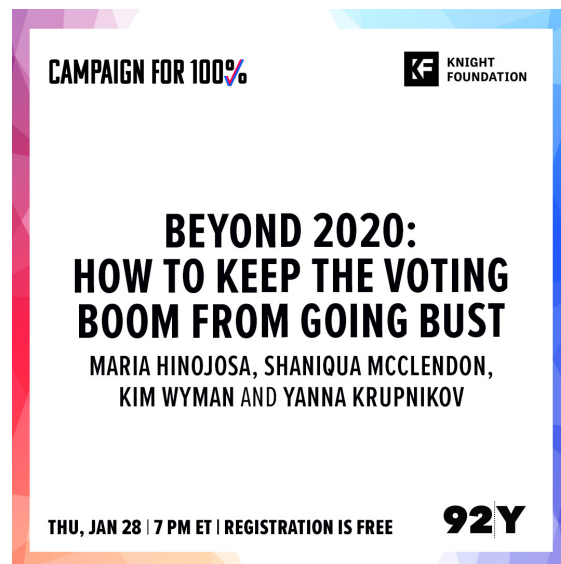

Beyond 2020: How to keep the voting boom from going
