The <u>N.C. Housing Opportunities and Prevention of Evictions (HOPE) Program</u> is <u>open</u> for a second application period to assist very low-income renters that are experiencing financial hardship due to COVID-19.

The program helps prevent evictions and utility disconnections to promote housing stability during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. The HOPE Program serves renters who meet certain eligibility requirements in <u>88 North Carolina counties</u>. Visit the <u>HOPE Interactive Map</u> to find the program that serves your area.

National Month of Action for Vaccination

President Joe Biden <u>announced</u> a National Month of Action to mobilize an all-of-America sprint to get 70% of U.S. adults at least one shot by July 4th, so that more people can get the protection they need to be safe from a pandemic that has taken the lives of nearly 600,000 Americans.

This National Month of Action will mobilize national organizations, local government leaders, community-based and faith-based partners, businesses, employers, social media influencers, celebrities, athletes, colleges, young people, and thousands of volunteers. Initiatives include:

- Free child care for individuals getting vaccinated: Four of the nation's largest child care providers will offer free child care to all parents and caregivers getting vaccinated or recovering from vaccination from now until July 4th.
- Extended hours at pharmacies across the country in June to offer more flexible appointment availability: Starting next week, thousands of pharmacies nationwide, including CVS and Walgreens, will stay open late every Friday in June, and offer services throughout the night to make sure Americans can get their shot. These extended hours will ensure that those with less flexible work hours have the opportunity to get vaccinated at times convenient to them.

7 Things You Should Know About the COVID-19 Vaccines



- 1. No serious side effects were reported in clinical trials. Temporary reactions after receiving the vaccine may include a sore arm, headache, feeling tired and achy for a day or two, or, in some cases, fever. In most cases, these reactions are good signs that your body is building protection.
- 2. **Scientists had a head start.** The vaccines are built on decades of research on vaccines for similar viruses.
- 3. You cannot get COVID-19 from the vaccine.
- 4. Concerns about safety are taken seriously. The CDC and FDA are constantly

monitoring safety and updating North Carolinians with the best safety information.

- 5. A hundred million people in the U.S. have already received their COVID-19 vaccine.
- 6. **It works.** The vaccines are proven to help prevent COVID-19 and are effective in preventing hospitalization and death.
- 7. **The vaccine does not affect fertility.** Vaccination for those who are pregnant or wanting to become pregnant is recommended by numerous medical groups.
