Howard University establishes Knight Chair in Race in Journalism and appoints Nikole Hannah-Jones

Knight Foundation has a long tradition of funding endowed chairs at our nation's leading universities, so that distinguished journalists can bring their practical experience to the classroom. When Howard University approached us to establish a Knight Chair in Race and Journalism to train the next generation of Black journalists, we felt they were the right university at the right moment to do this because of their tradition of academic excellence and training of American leaders.

Knight's \$5 million investment to establish the chair at Howard — our first in over a decade includes \$500,000 for the chair to help launch a symposium to strengthen journalism teaching across America's Historically Black Colleges and Universities.

We are delighted that Howard has named distinguished journalist Hannah-Jones as the inaugural Knight Chair in Race and Journalism. Howard also announced that another iconic American writer, Ta-Nehisi Coates, will join the university faculty, and that the MacArthur and Ford Foundations, along with an unidentified donor, had committed \$5 million each to the university, bringing the total to \$20 million.

Knight endows academic chairs, not individual professors.
