Health Officials Urge North Carolinians to Get Vaccinated as **COVID** Cases Increase




NCDHHS is urging all unvaccinated North Carolinians to get a COVID-19 vaccine as cases, hospitalizations and deaths have been inching up across the state.

North Carolina's early warning systems are showing more people going to the emergency department with COVID-like illness and elevated viral levels in wastewater in certain regions of the state.

The more infectious and potentially more dangerous Delta variant is also rapidly spreading in North Carolina and across the country.

Since May, more than 99% of new cases in North Carolina have occurred in people who are not fully vaccinated. <u>Vaccines</u> are proven to be effective against COVID-19 and its variants. North Carolinians can go to MySpot.nc.gov to find a vaccine location.



Bladen County Still Experiencing Critical Viral Spread

While North Carolina's key metrics continue to show low levels of virus spread overall, the latest COVID-19 County Alert System Map shows that Bladen County is still experiencing critical viral spread. Bladen County was first listed as experiencing critical viral spread on June 25.

Areas with low vaccination rates have seen increased COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations and deaths. People should get vaccinated as guickly as possible to slow the spread of the virus.

The <u>COVID-19 County Alert System</u> uses metrics informed by North Carolina's key metrics to categorize counties into five tiers (see map key above). These metrics provide information about the amount of viral spread and hospital impact in the county. The map is updated every two weeks.

According to the latest map, one county (Bladen) is experiencing critical viral spread and one county (Wilson) is experiencing substantial viral spread. Of the remaining counties, 29 are experiencing significant viral spread, 50 are experiencing moderate viral spread and 19 are experiencing low viral spread.

YOUR SHOT **AT \$1 MILLION** SUMMER CASH DRAWING

The second round of winners of the state's Your Shot at \$1 Million Summer Cash Drawing and Summer Cash 4 College drawings will be announced next week, but there are still two more \$1 million and college scholarship drawings.

North Carolinians 18 and over who have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine, including people vaccinated at a pharmacy participating in the Federal Retail Pharmacy Program, are automatically entered into the drawings for a chance to win a \$1 million cash prize.

Youth between the ages of 12 and 17 who have received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine are automatically entered into the drawings to win \$125,000 toward post-secondary education, awarded by funding a savings account in the NC 529 Plan.

Those vaccinated prior to June 10 are entered once, while those vaccinated after that date are entered twice. New entries will close at midnight on the Sunday prior to the Wednesday drawing. The next two drawings will occur on July 21 and Aug. 4.

How Summer Camps Can Reduce COVID-19 Risk





There are steps summer camps can take to reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19. These include:

- Requiring that all staff and eligible campers get vaccinated. Getting a vaccination is the best way to protect yourself, prevent the spread of COVID-19, and protect others.
- Asking unvaccinated campers and staff members to engage in a two-week prearrival quarantine that includes physical distancing, wearing a mask when not at home, avoiding unnecessary travel, and refraining from indoor social gatherings

with people outside of their households.

 Asking campers and staff who are not fully vaccinated to provide proof of a negative viral test taken no more than three days before their arrival.

COVID-19 Testing

You don't have to wonder if it's allergies, a cold, or COVID-19. Be sure and get tested. Anyone who has symptoms of COVID-19, has been around people outside of their household or thinks they have been exposed to the virus should get tested.

Getting a test has never been easier! North Carolina has no-cost community testing events scheduled throughout the state, including sites that offer rapid testing. For an upto-date list of events, visit the No-Cost Testing Events webpage. For details about a specific event, call ahead before you go for a test.

NCDHHS also expanded the availability of its at-home COVID-19 test collection. All North Carolina residents may request a COVID-19 PCR Test Home Collection Kit shipped overnight directly to their homes at no cost.

COVID-19 testing is also provided at some local health departments, doctor and clinician offices, hospitals and clinics, many pharmacy sites and retail outlets, and other community locations. You can find testing sites by using the Find My Testing Place tool online.
