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The Why

Digital Charlotte launched the Digital Navigator program as part of its overall mission to empower organizations to deliver digital and media literacy resources to their communities and thus promoting digital equity for residents in Mecklenburg County's most underserved neighborhoods where the digital divide is most prevalent.

The Digital Navigator program was developed with a simple goal in mind — to connect communities in Charlotte. Currently, there is no centralized place to find information on and get help with;

- Signing up for affordable home broadband internet service
- Purchasing affordable technology
- Basic device and connectivity issues
- Learning new digital skills








The How
