#### **BUILDING SELF-EFFICACY**

OF CYC FELLOWS HAD INCREASED SELF-EFFICACY\* ON THE CAREER AND COLLEGE READINESS SELF-EFFICACY INVENTORY AFTER JUST ONE YEAR AT CYC

Fellows from homes with incomes between 21-40K (89%) and those that attended a Title 1 School (89%) had the highest levels of growth.

\*Research shows students with higher self-efficacy, particularly those from under-resourced backgrounds, tend to have better self-regulation, be more resilient and motivated, demonstrate stronger academic performance and achievement, are better prepared to adapt to and succeed in their first year in college, go on to have more successful careers, are open to a wider range of career choices, and are overall happier and healthier.



# **SOS SCHOLARSHIP**

In 2020, SOS Scholarship Fund was endowed by Andrea and Sean Smith and awards gap scholarships annually to participants of Carolina Youth Coalition who are planning to attend a 4-year university but may fall short of being able to afford a best-fit college.

This year, 7 Fellows received the award. A total of 20 Fellows have been awarded \$114,000 in scholarships to-date!






# PRELIMINARY FINANCIAL RESULTS

#### **REVENUE**


\$1,213,968
