
The Mecklenburg County Department of Social Services is offering help to residents this winter by providing Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) funds to eligible households.

LIEAP is a federal program that assists low-income households with their immediate heating needs, so they won't have to choose between heating their homes and buying other necessities.

You do not have to be at risk of disconnection or delinquent to take advantage of this one-time, direct vendor payment in the amount of \$300, \$400, or \$500.



When do I apply for LIEAP?



LIEAP Payments- Checks will be send directly to the utility companies/ vendors. The amount of the payment is based on the household's source of fuel (e.g., electric, gas, etc.) and other criteria. For more information, please visit our county website: **mecknc.gov/ENERGY**

The Crisis Intervention Program is a federal program that assists individuals and families who are experiencing a heating or cooling related crisis, a life threatening or health related emergency, and have a final notice or past due utility bill.

Assistance is available yearround or until funds are exhausted.

Paths for RISE Customers

Rapid Employment

- ➤ Customers only interested in working
- Customers with a degree or recent vocational training
- Education/Training will be explored if employment is not secured within 30 days

Education and Training

- Customers who are interested in expanding their vocational knowledge and skills
- Education/Training will most often last between 2-4 months, but may not exceed two years (CPCC)
- ➤ Education/Training must be related to employment













American Community Survey (Poverty Estimates)



Poverty Statistics – Children vs. Adults





