## NCDHHS Requests Federal Assistance Amid Hospital Strain

The highly contagious omicron variant of COVID-19 is <u>sending record numbers of people</u> to North Carolina hospitals, straining hospital capacity. As hospitals continue to take steps to protect their ability to provide patient care in the face of nationwide COVID-19 related staffing shortages, NCDHHS and North Carolina Emergency Management are <u>requesting federal support for the Charlotte region</u> to help alleviate capacity constraints.

<u>Vaccines and boosters</u> continue to provide the strongest protection against COVID-19 serious illness, hospitalizations and deaths. In the latest <u>Respiratory Surveillance Report</u>, unvaccinated individuals make up 72% of hospitalizations and 83% of COVID-19-related ICU admissions statewide. Everyone age 5 and older should get a COVID-19 vaccine, and everyone 12 and older should get a booster as soon as they are eligible. Go to <u>MySpot.nc.gov</u> to find a vaccine location.

NCDHHS Continues to Focus on Equity as COVID-19 Disparities

Re-Emerge in Omicron Surge

According to NCDHHS data, the rate of COVID-19 infections is once again disproportionately impacting Black and Hispanic North Carolinians. Since Dec. 26, the rate of infections was twice as high among the Black population as compared to the white population and as much as 57% higher among the Hispanic population as compared to the non-Hispanic population.

To combat these disparities, NCDHHS continues its work through the <u>Healthier Together:</u>
<u>Health Equity Action Network</u> and <u>NCDHHS' Community Health Worker program</u> to connect historically marginalized populations to vaccines. Additionally, to help families be able to safely quarantine or isolate because of COVID-19, NCDHHS' <u>Support Services</u>
<u>Program</u> provides food assistance to people in 34 counties in partnership with the Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina.

NCDHHS is also delivering N95 masks, which provide the best protection from the Omicron variant of COVID-19, to community organizations, childcare programs, farmworker programs and long-term care facilities across the state. Of the 4 million delivered so far, 2 million masks were given to local health departments to distribute to community partners for local jails, for providers for homeless services, for senior centers and at community-based events.

NCDHHS has been nationally recognized for its race and ethnicity data quality and has prioritized data transparency to hold itself and its partners accountable to promote equity in COVID-19 prevention and response efforts. ## Federal Pharmacy COVID-19 Vaccine Information Now Available Through NC Portal




People who received their COVID-19 vaccine or booster in North Carolina from a pharmacy or grocery store participating in the <u>Federal Retail Pharmacy Program</u> are <u>now able to access their COVID-19 vaccine information</u> in the <u>NC COVID-19 Vaccine Portal</u>.

For security purposes, people will need to first activate their Vaccine Portal by calling the COVID-19 Vaccine Help Center at (888) 675-4567 to verify their identity. The help center is open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.


#### **COVID-19 Fireside Chat**

Give Blood to Help During the Blood Shortage



Yesterday, Governor Cooper donated blood at the American Red Cross of Eastern North Carolina and encouraged eligible North Carolinians to make an appointment to give blood. The American Red Cross is facing a severe blood shortage and the Governor has <a href="mailto:proclaimed">proclaimed</a> January as <a href="mailto:Blood Donation Month">Blood Donation Month</a> in North Carolina.

Every two seconds, someone in the United States needs blood. An estimated one in every seven patients will need a blood transfusion in a hospital. All types of blood are needed, especially types O positive and O negative. Visit <u>redcrossblood.org</u> or go to the bloodconnection.org to learn more and schedule an appointment to donate blood.

## **COVID-19 Testing**

Anyone who has symptoms of COVID-19 or has been exposed to the virus should get tested as soon as possible. Seek medical attention immediately for serious symptoms such as trouble breathing, persistent pain or pressure in the chest, new confusion or inability to arouse, or bluish lips or face.

- NC Medicaid beneficiaries can <u>receive free at-home COVID-19 tests</u> from their local pharmacies. Beneficiaries should select an at-home test at their preferred pharmacy and present their NC Medicaid ID card to the pharmacy for no out-ofpocket cost. The pharmacist will be able to bill Medicaid on the patient's behalf.
- Every home in the U.S. is eligible to order four, free at-home COVID-19 tests. Order your tests now so you have them when you need them at <u>covidtests.gov</u>.
- To find a PCR testing sites near you, visit <a href="ncdhhs.gov/GetTested">ncdhhs.gov/GetTested</a>. With increased demand for testing, try a different community-based site if your normal one is busy.
