The committee heard from industry experts from across the country, including Dr. Rissmiller, the Executive Vice President of [**Atrium Health**](#), on the benefits and potential unintended consequences of telehealth services. This was the final meeting before Short Session begins, and the **committee Chairs** stated that there is still not a final consensus on if there will be a plan to include Medicaid expansion in legislative discussions for Short Session.

Interview with Spectrum News on Voting Rights




Earlier this month I recorded an interview about voting rights with the “In Focus” News Show on Spectrum News. The other guest was Senator Hise, Chair of the Senate Elections Committee. You can see that interview [here](#).

I spoke about the [recent](#) court ruling that it is unconstitutional to deny people their right to vote while they are on probation or parole. **The court held that once incarceration ends, voting rights must be restored.** This is a the largest expansion of

voting rights in NC since the Voting Rights Act in 1965, impacting 50,000+ North Carolinians.

Cornelius Residents Advocate to Save Smithville with ARPA Funds



I joined residents of Cornelius at Town Hall on April 18 to **urge the Town Board to appropriate the \$6.6 million needed to enact the Smithville Revitalization Plan**. The town is getting a total of \$9.6 million of federal ARPA funds, which is separate from its regular revenues and budget. Willie Jones, who has been the leader in developing the Plan, asked the Board to "Please take

responsibility," after so many years of ignoring the needs of this historically African American neighborhood and its residents. **It's a matter of racial equity and important for preservation of history and affordable housing.**

The Town will be seeking a second round of resident input soon, so you are encouraged to respond to that with your priorities. I will continue to seek state funding to help fund this important effort to Save Smithville.

Jessica Boesmiller was diagnosed with ocular melanoma during her pregnancy with her twins, about five years ago. The cancer spread through her body. Despite many heroic attempts to save her life, she died this week, leaving everyone who knew her heartbroken. I knew her from our time at the Lake Norman YMCA and want to express my deep condolences to her husband, Mark, their four children and the rest of her family. Good News: Transportation Revenue Forecast





Many areas of SD41 need road improvements due to population growth. [**NC Department of Transportation**](#) has been underfunded, causing many local projects to be delayed. This week, we got some good news about revenue for DOT and I'm hopeful that this will mean **local road projects can get moving forward without further delays.**


The Fiscal Research Division and the Office of State Budget and Management have reached consensus on revisions to the Highway Fund and Highway Trust Fund forecast for the 2021-23 biennium.

The **forecast expects revenue to be above the amount budgeted to the Department of Transportation**, which was based on the June 2021 revised forecast.

- For FY 2021-22, the current fiscal year, combined Highway Fund and Highway Trust Fund revenues are revised upward by \$182.5 million (4.4%).
- For FY 2022-23, forecasted revenues for the two funds are revised upward by \$248.9 million (5.7%).

The current year's anticipated over-collection is driven by motor fuel tax collections, which increased because consumption returned to pre-pandemic levels faster than anticipated in the June 2021 forecast. In addition, the rise in vehicle prices led to highway use tax collections exceeding expectations. The highway use tax is charged when a vehicle is sold, and the amount of tax is based on the price of the vehicle.




Meeting with Mecklenburg County Stakeholders, including the Towns of Davidson, Cornelius and Huntersville



Street Maintenance and Powell Bill Funding

- ▶ State Powell Bill allocations fund a large part of the City's local street maintenance budget
- ▶ Over the past two years, the City's Powell Bill allocation has been capped at an amount below the City's FY 2020 statutory allocation
- ▶ Request is that the City's allocation be restored to statutory funding

Studying Impacts of Coal Rolling in North Carolina

Rolling Coal in the US

Coal rolling is the process of modifying a vehicle's exhaust system or engine to emit excess exhaust.



The practice of rolling coal has a negative impact on air quality equivalent to that of 9 million, emission-compliant pickup trucks.

Issues of Enforcement

- No Preventative Hard/Software
- Police Inaction
- Tamper-Friendly Vehicle Inspectors

Emission Facts:

The EPA estimates that rolling coal has contributed to an excess release of:

- 570,000 tons of Nitrous Oxide
- 5,000 tons of Particulate Matter


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I am working on the issue of coal rolling, which poses a **growing public safety and environmental threat**. For those who are unaware of the practice, it is summed up in the graphic above.

I sought the assistance of the [Duke PolicyLab](#) to assess which policy solutions would be most successful. Their advice was to change the law to allow citations for rolling coal and to expand vehicle inspections to include a check for the after-market modifications which enable diesel vehicles to roll coal.

I will continue to consider the options about how to proceed and will be working with my colleague in the House, Rep John Autry. If you have been the target of coal rolling in NC, please contact my office.

COVID-19 Updates





The [DHHS COVID-19 Dashboard](#), which is updated weekly every Wednesday, shows the following data points:

- Wastewater testing has shown an increase to 11.3m particles from 5.1m particles.
- COVID-like illness in hospital emergency departments remains steady at 2%.
- COVID-19 reported cases for the week are up to 9,431 from 7,587.
- COVID-19 hospital admissions of COVID-19 patients the week are down to 254, compared to last week which was at 277.
- Booster rates are 53% for the total population. We have 76% of adults with at least one dose and 38% of children and teens ages 5-17 with at least one dose.
- 10.38% of the cases are Omicron BA.1, 87.81% are Omicron BA.2.

Airport Community Roundtable Seeks Davidson Representative



The Airport Community Roundtable (ACR) at the Charlotte airport (CLT) is seeking a representative from the Town of Davidson. The ACR is a **broad-based community initiative to provide input into airport-related noise impacts and to find, where possible, practical solutions and recommendations** for the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to consider when determining aircraft operating procedures at CLT.

ACR membership consists of twenty-five representatives from across Charlotte and Mecklenburg County as well as Gaston and York counties. The FAA, airlines, and the airport serve as advisory members of the ACR. The meetings are professionally facilitated by an airport consultant and supported by professional technical consultants, with the purpose of discussing and, possibly, proposing recommendations for aircraft operating changes at CLT.

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
