Education Panel

A bipartisan panel of North Carolina lawmakers, educators and business people Monday released a report on changes they say could help students succeed in school. The recommendations start with more child care support for infants and toddlers and run through plans to help more young adults afford college.

The Hunt-Lee commission is named for the co-chairs: Former Gov.

Jim Hunt and former state Sen. Howard Lee, both Democrats, and Republican state Sen. Michael Lee, who chairs the Senate education committee. The 32–person panel includes state officials, business and philanthropic leaders and representatives of K-12 and higher education.

The group released **20** pages of findings at a news conference. Among some of the proposals:

- Expand child care subsidies to ensure that families can afford high-quality care.
- Spend more on the NC Pre-K program, which currently provides free prekindergarten for 4-year-olds.
- Provide higher salaries for top teachers to work in high-needs schools.
- Create bridge programs that help students make the transition from middle to high school, where academic achievement often drops and behavior problems can rise.

I believe helping students succeed is important to the competitiveness of our students. Implementing many of these recommendations can do that, as well as, providing teachers adequate supplies.

Counseling Grant

North Carolina has been awarded a \$3.3 million grant to expand support for people in mental health crises. On July 16, 2022, the 9-8-8 National Suicide Prevention Lifeline number replaces the 10-digit 1-800-273-TALK number currently in use.

NCDHHS has indicated that one of their top priorities is increasing access to behavioral health services. Choosing 988 is easy to remember and people can access from wherever they are and get the help they need. The 988 call center is staffed 24 hours a day, year-round with people trained to provide crisis counseling and information about community resources available.

Fan Distribution

With the summer months coming the heat could become unbearable. State officials say they will distribute the fans to eligible people beginning Sunday and running through Halloween as part of Operation Fan Heat Relief. The program is run by the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services' Division of Aging and Adult Services, in partnership with the N.C. Area Agencies on Aging and local service providers. People who are 60 and older, and adults with disabilities, are eligible to sign up for the program at local aging agencies across the state.

Since 1986, the program has bought fans for older adults and those with disabilities to make them more comfortable and lower the risk of heat-related illness.

It is important to take care of our aging population any way we can. Many of our elderly citizens would not be able to afford purchasing a fan, so programs like these are very helpful.
