Noteworthy Votes and Co-Sponsored Bills



Below is a list of some of the noteworthy bills I have voted on and co-sponsored for Short Session. You can see a full list of the bills I have introduced and voted on since the start of the biennium [here](#).

Noteworthy Bills I Voted YES on:

- [SB711](#), **NC Compassionate Care Act**. Legalizes medical marijuana for qualified

patients with certain medical conditions through a regulated medical cannabis supply system. While I agree that this is not a perfect bill, I voted yes because when it is regulated, marijuana is a safe alternative to pharmaceuticals for patients who want this option and because this bill was a compromise approach that could pass with a Republican majority at the General Assembly.

- **[SB762](#), North Carolina Farm Act of 2022.** A bipartisan bill that makes various changes to NC's agricultural laws, including making the exception for hemp in the NC Controlled Substances Act permanent (so we are following federal guidelines) and other various technical changes. This protects the hemp industry in NC. It has been a pilot program and will now be permanently authorized. This ensures that consumers will be able to continue to purchase CBD products and businesses will be able to continue to sell them.
- **[SB766](#), Organized Retail Theft.** Amends the organized retail theft statutes as recommended by the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Justice and Public Safety. Organized retail theft has been a growing concern in Mecklenburg County. I met with representatives from Home Depot earlier this year and was briefed on the sophisticated networks criminals use to steal and resell goods, driving up prices. This bill will also help address the baby formula shortage, as some products that are typically stolen are baby formula -- read more [here](#).
- **[HB149](#), Expanding Access to Healthcare.** Finally -- the North Carolina General Assembly has voted to expand Medicaid under the ACA! I was happy to vote yes on this bill, while I do have some concerns about the other provisions packed into the omnibus bill, overall this is an important step forward for healthcare access in North Carolina. Unfortunately, it looks like [the House will not be putting the bill up for a vote](#) until at least December.
- **[HB219](#), Amend Environmental Laws.** Expands DEQ's authorization for use of river debris funding, aligns Coastal Area Management Act public notice requirements for land-use hearings with existing local government notice requirements, and directs DEQ to study the express permit and certification review program.
- **[HB315](#), Arson Law Revisions.** Bipartisan bill that increases punishment for certain arson offenses, amends offense of arson resulting in injury of firefighter, law enforcement officer, fire investigator, or EMT, requires criminal background checks of applicants to fire departments, and prohibits persons convicted of certain crimes from serving as volunteer or paid members of a fire department.
- **[HB607](#), Amend Automatic Expunction.** Temporarily suspends the automatic expunction of dismissed criminal charges, not guilty verdicts, and findings of not responsible to allow court system to address complications in the new expunction laws.
- **[HB615](#), Jordan's Law.** Allows a court to temporarily extend a domestic violence order of protection if a court date to consider the extension has been set after the expiration date on the order. I collaborated with domestic violence advocates on this bill to ensure the language met their needs and was instrumental in getting it amended to ensure the extended DVPOs would be enforceable.

Noteworthy Bills I Voted NO on:

- **[HB755](#), Parents' Bill of Rights.** I voted no on this harmful bill because it attempts to make us pretend that LGBTQ people don't exist by banning any discussion about them. The bill requires disclosure of confidential counseling notes and forces students out against their will and/or before they are ready and encourages

lawsuits against teachers who share pro-equality resources.

Noteworthy Bills I Co-Sponsored:

- **[SB791](#), Inclusionary Zoning/Workforce Housing Funds.** Supplements the availability of affordable housing by allowing local governments to provide for inclusionary zoning and to appropriate funds to the NC Finance Agency for the workforce housing loan program.
- **[SB800](#), Law Enforcement Investment Act.** Strengthens policies and standards for law enforcement officers and appropriates funds for NC Justice Academy and NC Criminal Justice Fellows Program.
- **[SB805](#), Small Business Investment Grant.** Appropriates \$250M to the Department of Commerce to provide funds to small business due to the ongoing financial impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- **[SB807](#), Student Mental Health Support Act.** Appropriates \$400M for a School Mental Health Grant Program.
- **[SB823](#), Crime Victims Compensation Fund Expansion.** Bipartisan bill that increases certain allowable expanses to be paid to victims of crimes from the Crime Victims Compensation Fund.
- **[SB826](#), Homeowner Solar Expansion Act.** Clarifies the law governing deed restrictions on solar collectors and allows for certain third-party sales of renewable energy.
- **[SB830](#), PFAS Firefighting Foam Replacement.** Bipartisan bill that provides funds for the replacement and disposal of firefighting foam containing PFAS.
- **[SB831](#), Opioid Overdose Prevention Act.** Appropriates funds to DHHS Division of Public Health to purchase opioid antagonists for local health departments to distribute free of charge to NC residents.
- **[SB848](#), Tax Relief for NC Employees & Unemployment Insurance Reform.** Reforms unemployment insurance laws, increases benefits allowed for partial unemployment, and authorizes the forgiveness of nonfraudulent overpayments caused by agency error.
- **[SB851](#), Restore Educational Sales Tax Holiday.** Reenacts the sales and use tax holiday for school supplies.
- **[SB852](#), Tax Relief on Essentials for Working Families.** Exempts feminine hygiene products, diapers, and groceries from sales tax.
- **[SB854](#), Carolina's Guarantee Scholarship Program.** Establishes the Community College Promise Scholarship Program.
- **[SB858](#), Retired Earned Income Tax Credit.** Reenacts the earned income tax credit.
- **[SB859](#), In-State Tuition Flexibility Act.** Authorizes certain beneficiaries of the federal Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) initiative to receive in-state tuition at the University of North Carolina constituent institutions and community colleges in the state.
- **[SB862](#), Cancer Research/Funds.** Bipartisan bill that implements certain recommendations of the advisory panel on cancer research.
- **[SB867](#), High-Impact Tutoring Grant Program.** Creates a high-impact tutoring grant program to address learning loss resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.
- **[SB897](#), Gas Tax Rebate Act.** Provides \$200 gas tax rebate to assist families to pay for the high costs of gas and other products associated with inflation.

This week reproductive rights advocates from across the state came to Raleigh to express their support for abortion rights my bill, [Senate Bill 888](#), Codify Roe and Casey Protections, and HB1119, Reproductive Freedom Act. **I am proud to have support from the entire Senate Democratic Caucus on SB888, an important piece of legislation that seeks to maintain the status quo on abortion access in NC.** As I said in my remarks to the crowd, **we must ensure that we are protecting the right to choose and the right to privacy**, especially in the wake of a Supreme Court that seems increasingly likely to take those rights away from us.

The bill addresses both poverty prevention and improved school attendance.

I am proud to be a primary sponsor of this vital piece of legislation and was inspired to hear from advocates from across the state as they have continued to support and work with local leaders on the important issue of menstrual equity.

One of my favorite parts of this job is when advocacy groups come to Raleigh for an advocacy day, where they meet with legislators to discuss their legislative priorities and share their personal stories. It's even better when the advocates are also constituents. An overview of some of my recent advocacy day meetings is below.





ARTS Advocacy Day meeting with Mecklenburg constituents and ASC. We discussed the importance of arts education and how it impacts SD41. I learned about a North Mecklenburg drummer who uses his art to teach math, called the Number Drummer. Very fun!



I met with members of the Mecklenburg Chapter of the Audubon Society to discuss various conservation efforts. They are prioritizing [House Bill 367](#), Uniform Heirs Partition Act.



I met with advocates from Huntersville and the Charlotte area with the National Multiple Sclerosis Society. They support [HB149](#) which would expand Medicaid, and [SB711](#), which would legalize medical marijuana. I am proud to have voted YES on both bills.



Thank you to the Cornelius town officials and staff members who stopped by the office. We discussed various local priorities, including funding for ocular melanoma and the need for road improvements in Cornelius.

Two Children Need Your Help





COVID-19 Updates



COVID-19 INFORMATION AND UPDATES

The [DHHS COVID-19 Dashboard](#), which is updated weekly every Wednesday, shows the following data points:

- Wastewater testing has shown an **increase** to 27.3m particles from 26.5m particles.
- COVID-like illness in hospital emergency departments remains steady at 5%.
- COVID-19 reported cases for the week decreased to 24,941 cases from 27,552/

- COVID-19 hospital admissions of COVID-19 patients this week **going up** at 833, compared to last week which was at 735.
- Booster rates are 56% for the total population. We have 77% of adults with at least one dose and 38% of children and teens ages 5-17 with at least one dose.
- 57.9% of cases are Omicron BA.2.12.1, 36.79% Omicron BA.2, 3.39% Omicron BA.5, 1.02% Omicron BA.4, 0.06% Omicron BA.1.1, and 0.83% for all other variants.

If you have COVID-19 symptoms do not wait to get tested and talk to your doctor about treatment. Don't wait. COVID-19 [treatments](#) can lower your risk of hospitalization or death. Talk to your doctor about treatment. Call 1-800-232-0233 to find out more about treatment. The call center can help if you do not have a health care provider. 
