Biomedical Push

There is a big push from North Carolina lawmakers for a major federal biomedical facility to be headquartered in the state. In a letter written to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, members of North Carolina's Congressional Delegation urged the agency to make their state the headquarter for the Advanced Research Projects Agency for Health. ARPA-H was a proposal from the United State's President to improve the country's ability to speed up biomedical and health research.

The center would focus on making breakthroughs in the way the U.S. prevents, treats, and cures a range of diseases including cancer, infectious diseases, and Alzheimer's disease. Its creation was signed into law in March.

The state is not alone in its bid to call the center home. There is competition with Georgia, Massachusetts, Ohio, and Pennsylvania who have also thrown their hat in the ring to headquarter ARPA-H. It's unclear when or how DHHS will appoint a headquarters for the facility. It is also unknown when the center will open.

Nursing Shortage

Nursing shortages are leading some hospitals to take drastic measures. Some hospitals in NC have announced that they are temporarily suspending operations of its ICU. Patients are being encouraged to go to other hospitals for care.

The Association of Nurses explains there are pipeline challenges in recruiting new workers. There are limited number of seats in nursing schools because of faculty availability.

Gun Violence

Police chiefs from around the state met Monday with the Governor and Attorney General to discuss gun violence, and to share a laundry list of police force needs. Many chiefs say their departments are struggling to recruit and retain quality officers, and to deal with the mental health issues that they say are at the root of so many calls for service. Some have expressed interest in co-responder policing, where a mental health professional accompanies officers on certain calls.

The Governor and Attorney General reiterated their calls for stricter gun laws during the listening session, and particularly for red flag laws, which allow a judge, once convinced someone is a danger to themselves or others, to temporarily take that person's guns. The Attorney General said North Carolina should raise the age to buy a semi-automatic rifle, including AR-15's, from 18 years old to 21. He noted 18 year olds cannot buy alcohol, but they can buy high-powered rifles used in so many mass shootings.

The chiefs had a number of requests including:

- Tougher penalties for firing a gun, even if no one is injured.
- State-funded incentives to help police departments attract and retain officers.
- More willingness from the state Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission to revoke liquor licenses at establishments with frequent problems. Several chiefs complained that owners are able to get those licenses back, or they simply find someone else to put their name on the license and reopen.

Bail reform. Several chiefs said they'd like to see more uniformity in the bonds magistrates set, as well as higher bonds in some cases.

The issue cited most often: mental health. The chiefs repeatedly said they need more and better options to deal with people in a mental health crisis, beyond arresting them or taking them to the emergency room.
