






Our History

The overall concept of "The 100" began in 1963 in New York City when a group of concerned African American men began to meet to explore ways of improving conditions in their community. These visionaries included businessmen and industry leaders such as David Dinkins, Robert Mangum, Dr. William Hayling, Nathaniel Goldston III, and Jackie Robinson. On October 2, 1986, representatives from 100 Black Men Chapters converged in Washington, DC, for a final meeting to establish a national organization. During previous meetings, they determined the structure, governance and model that would provide the most effective physical and financial resources to support the communities and Chapters. At the final gathering, the organization's name - 100 Black Men of America, Inc. - was unveiled.









THE 100 TODAY

The global network of 100 Black Men is made up of leaders built to mentor future leaders. Proven programs and services successfully educate and empower while Mentoring the 100 Way Across A Lifetime.

- A global network of chapters and mentors;
- Mentoring over 125,000 youth annually;
- A History of advocating for disenfranchised communities;
- Hundred (100) Black Men deliver Four For the Future programmatic initiatives (Mentoring, Education, Health & Wellness, and Economic Empowerment) overlaid by leadership;
- Delivering partner scholarships, annual scholarship fairs and chapter scholarships that collectively award students millions of dollars a year;
- Collaborating with corporate and community partners to deliver services and unique supplemental education programs;
- Hundred (100) chapters have partnered, sponsored and in some locations, chartered schools in response to the education crisis in America;
- Fifty Five (55) Collegiate Chapters across the United States deliver peer to peer mentoring and volunteer support to 100 Black Men Chapters;

MOY University Concept

The MOY University will attempt to support the "Four For The Future "initiatives (Mentoring, Education, Health & Wellness, Economic Empowerment), through the implementation of a classroom style environment that will consist of group instruction and will take place every other Saturday. The "Saturday Academy", in conjunction with "one on one mentoring" will be the core of our mentoring offering.

The concept will involve four 50-minute classes every other Saturday, presented by the membership of the 100 Black Men of Greater Charlotte, in conjunction with community resources and prescreened professionals for subject matter delivery. The predetermined subject matter will support the information necessary to educate our mentees in the before mentioned areas that have been designated as the "Four for the Future"





Other Program Offerings

STEM – We have a robust Robotics and Drone program, which includes both FTC and LEGO robotics. This program takes place outside of the MOY curriculum for those students that are interested.

Tutoring – The 100 Black Men of Greater Charlotte provides tutoring assistance to our students that are facing academic challenges. Tutoring is provided through Mathnasium and Sylvan Learning Centers.

Scholarships - The 100 Black Men of Charlotte reserve the right to distribute annual awards in accordance with recommendations from its scholarship committee and approval from its board of directors. For 2021, the annual scholarship award combined limit is \$25,000.00 or \$6,250 per year for the next four years. Individual awards range from \$2,500 to \$10,000 and are paid over eight semesters. Applicants meeting or exceeding qualifications for an award are not guaranteed to receive the award. Distribution of the awards will be in a fair and equitable manner in accordance with the funds available.







Other Program Offerings Pathways to Success

The Charlotte Chapter of 100 Black Men is the creative founder for the Pathways to Success program.

- A 15-week virtual program designed to prepare the next generation of Corporate Leaders and Entrepreneurs held from February to May.
- Targeted for high achieving male and female high school juniors or seniors, and college students throughout Greater Charlotte area.
- Includes experiential and academic learning experiences.
- One on One coaching and mentoring with local corporate leaders.
- Soft skills and career readiness workshops.
- Participants receive certificate of complete and partner rewards at closing ceremony.



Other Program Offerings Collegiate 100

The Collegiate 100® is a campus-based student organization with its programmatic initiatives that support the development of social, emotional, and educational needs of youth who need positive role models in the communities in which they live. The Collegiate 100®program is not designed to, nor will it be permitted to operate as, as an autonomous, separate group that operates independently from the sponsoring chapter.

The Collegiate 100® has an important role to play on the college campus. The effective execution of that role requires that the chapter be a responsible, productive, and cooperative segment of 100 Black Men of America, Inc. and the total college community. Membership into the Collegiate 100® is drawn primarily from African—American male and female college students through Chapters on university campuses across America. The primary purpose of the Collegiate 100® program is to provide an avenue for 100 Black Men of America, Inc. chapters to continue their one-on-one and group mentoring to students as they matriculate from high school to college; thereby supporting the Mentoring The 100 Way Across a Lifetime initiatives.

Current programs exist at UNC Charlotte and there are plans for a chapter at Johnson C. Smith University and Livingston College.



Other Program Offerings

100 Titan Program (Work-Force Ready)

The 100 Black Men Of Charlotte Titan Program is a new program that has been put in place to address young men in the 18 – 24 years of age category. During our work on our "Stop The Violence" initiative, it became evident that this was the age group that seem to be the primary perpetrators of the violent acts that we were trying to address.

To address the problem, the 100 is taking the following steps:

- Integration of the Titan Program with our "Pathways to Success" program to make sure that students
 have the appropriate soft skills to assure their success in the work environment.
- We will be partnering with CPCC and the Urban League to provide technical training to those young men who would like to learn a trade instead of earning a full college degree. We believe that this program will provide a much-needed educational alternative and direct path to being work-force ready. This is true economic empowerment.



Other Program Offerings Software Coding Initiative

We at the 100 understand that coding is a valuable skill and it's great for our students start learning early. We are surrounded by things powered by code, such as social media, websites and games. Our coding classes will not only teach teenagers how to code, but also, we teach them essential problem-solving skills, introduce them to a worldwide computer science community, and show them how to build computer programs that finish tasks more efficiently than a human could.

Additionally, coding helps in building resilience in students at a young age and is the new literacy. It helps in the development of computational skills. Coding helps the kids in furnishing many skills other than computational such as problem-solving and thinking. Computer science is one of the most popular college majors, so you can get a head start by learning early. Later in life, computer programming can offer a lucrative career. This program offering will be made available to all interested students in our Movement of Youth Family.



Other Program Offerings The Importance of Art in STEM Education

The 100 Black Men of Greater Charlotte realizes the importance of self expression in the development of our students. Consequently, we are in the process of adding an art component to our mentoring portfolio.

While we currently have a robust STEM program, involving the arts into STEAM projects can help students understand science, technology, engineering and mathematics in a different way, **increase engagement** when they connect the artistic mediums that they enjoy to these projects and allow them to explore these subjects in a non-pressured environment. The inclusion of arts in STEM curricula helps **build more interest** in the rest of the STEM topics. It gets students thinking about those topics and connecting them to the arts in more engaging, interesting, creative and actionable ways. As with all our other programs, The arts segment will be taught using local volunteer artist who have already been vetted through their participation in our QC Art initiative that took place earlier this year. This program offering will be made available to all interested students in our Movement of Youth Family.

TRIPLE P - POSITIVE PARENTING PROGRAM

WHAT IS TRIPLE P?

Triple P is a parenting program, but it doesn't tell you how to be a parent. It's more like a toolbox of ideas. You choose the strategies you need. You choose the way you want to use them. It's all about making Triple P work for you.

WHAT DOES TRIPLE P DO?

The three Ps in 'Triple P' stand for 'Positive Parenting Program' which means your family life is going to be much more enjoyable.

Triple P helps you:

- Raise happy, confident kids;
- Manage misbehavior so everyone in the family enjoys life more;
- Set rules and routines that everyone respects and follows;
- Encourage behavior you like;
- Take care of yourself as a parent;
- Feel confident you're doing the right thing;



COMMUNITY ADVOCACY PROGRAMS Stop The Violence

- The 100 BMOC has developed a project to draw awareness to the problem of rising violent crime rates in the Greater Charlotte area
- Partnered with Adams Outdoor Advertising to develop billboards that were erected throughout Charlotte on March 22nd
 - The billboard campaign will consist of numerous strategically-placed static and digital displays (Locations will be identified to optimize visibility)
- Due to this awareness campaign, the 100 BMOC will become an initial HUB and we want to drive interest to:
 - Galvanize a call to action
 - Partner with all relevant organizations to share best practices and create solutions that simply "alleviate the violence
 - Engage with the community on the resources out there to help





COMMUNITY ADVOCACY PROGRAMS

Political Advocacy

- We have created a coalition that consist of all four of the 100 Black Men Chapters in the State of NC.
- Our coalition is partnering with Black Voters Matter whose purpose is to advocate for policies to expand voting rights/access, including expanded early voting, resisting voter ID, re-entry restoration of rights and strengthening the Voting Rights Act.
- The 100 conducted a statewide educational seminar to educate our voters on the new voter suppression laws that are being introduced into our legislature and the ongoing issue of Black Men Voting.





COMMUNITY ADVOCACY PROGRAMS

Economic Empowerment Virtual Career Expo

While stopping the violence remains a critical initiative, the #100blackmench are committed to uplifting and providing economic empowerment opportunities to our community.

Economic empowerment is not limited to financial literacy. It also means creating economic mobility by increasing the community's access to Charlotte Metro employers and their employment opportunities.



Improving The Quality of Black Lives Through Prevention

The shameful excess mortality experienced by Black Americans, due to common but preventable chronic diseases is inexcusable. We can't wait for things to change for our people. To do so would constitute neglect and history will record a lack of leadership by our organization. We must immediately embrace the innovative strategies available to help reduce high morbidity and mortality rates, which disproportionately burden Black people. Our goal is to improve the quality of Black lives through prevention rather than relying solely on medical treatment options.





COMMUNITY ADVOCACY PROGRAMS

Health & Wellness Continued

The Community Health Fair is executed in parallel to initiatives focused on combatting both epidemics:

- The 100 Black Men of America's participation in the national Sleeves Up Violence Out campaign, an effort to increase youth vaccinations, blood donation, and preventing violence to save lives.
- The 100blackmencht Stop The Violence campaign, aimed at reducing the rate of violent crimes in Charlotte – where Black youth find themselves as victim, suspect, and innocent bystander at an exponentially greater number than non-Black youth.


Education


