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The Upstate New York Poison Center will mark Monday, Aug. 21, Fentanyl Prevention and Awareness Day, by sounding the alarm on fentanyl.

"Fentanyl is a potent synthetic opioid. It poses a significant national health issue, contributing to a concerning rise in opioid-related deaths nationwide," says Jeanna Marraffa, PharmD, clinical director of the Upstate New York Poison Center, "Similarly, our poison center based in Syracuse has observed an increase in poison-related calls involving fentanyl and its derivatives. We recognize the urgent need for proactive measures to combat this epidemic."

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, fentanyl is up to 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than morphine. It is a major contributor to fatal and nonfatal overdoses in the U.S. There are two types of fentanyl: pharmaceutical fentanyl and illegally made fentanyl. Both are considered synthetic opioids. Pharmaceutical fentanyl is prescribed by doctors to treat severe pain. However, most recent cases of fentanyl-related overdoses are linked to illegally made fentanyl.

The United States Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) reminds everyone that "One Pill Can Kill." The DEA says, "Never trust your own eyes to determine if a pill is legitimate. The only safe medications are ones prescribed by a trusted medical professional and dispensed by a licensed pharmacist."

The Upstate New York Poison Center encourages all families who have any opioid prescriptions, including fentanyl, in their home to keep the pills in their original container and keep the bottle out of reach and sight of children and teens. Fentanyl patches should be folded in half before disposing. The Poison Center also encourages the use of a lockbox for all prescription and non-prescription medicines.

If an individual is suspected of swallowing/inhaling a drug that might contain fentanyl:

- 1. Call 911 if the individual is not breathing
- 2. If one has access to Naloxone (Narcan), follow instructions to administer Narcan.
- 3. If the person is awake and breathing and, direct questions to the Poison Center at **1-800-222-1222**. It is recommended that individuals say this number to their contact list.

As a vital resource for communities in Upstate New York, the Upstate New York Poison Center remains steadfast in its mission to educate families and individuals about the dangers of fentanyl and provide essential guidance in times of crisis. poison center provides <u>free educational materials</u>, including brochures, posters, magnets, pencils, etc., for families, community centers, schools, and healthcare facilities throughout our 54-county coverage area.

EARLY VOTING

Early Voting Begins Thursday for Municipal Elections in Charlotte and Sanford; Voters Will Be Asked for Photo ID

The in-person early voting period for September 2023 municipal elections in CHARLOTTE and Sanford begins *Thursday, August 24, and ends Saturday, September 9*.

RALEIGH, N.C.

The in-person early voting period for September 2023 municipal elections in Charlotte and Sanford begins Thursday, August 24, and ends Saturday, September 9. This is the first election in which voters will be asked to show photo identification under a law enacted in 2018.

The State Board of Elections offers the following 10 tips for early voters in those two cities:

- 1. Eligible voters may cast a ballot at any early voting site in their county. For sites and hours, use the One-Stop Early Voting Site Search or read One-Stop Voting Sites for the September 12, 2023 Election (PDF).
- 2. Sample ballots are available for eligible voters through the Voter Search tool. To be eligible to vote in a municipal election, the voter must be registered and live in that municipality and, in some cases, the ward or district with a seat up for election.
- 3. Voters will be asked to show photo ID when checking in at the voting site. Most voters will simply show their driver's license, but there are many other acceptable photo IDs. For more information, including the full list of acceptable IDs, visit Voter ID.
- 4. If a voter cannot show a photo ID, they can still vote by filling out an ID Exception Form and voting a provisional ballot. County boards of elections must count provisional ballots with properly completed ID Exception Forms.
- 5. Don't have an ID? All county boards of elections can issue free voter photo IDs to registered voters in the county through the last day of early voting, which is September 9. To be issued a free voter photo ID card, the voter must provide their name, date of birth, and the last four numbers of their Social Security number, and have their photo taken. Additionally, any North Carolina resident can get a free non-driver's ID card from the DMV. Find more information under "No-Fee ID Cards" at State IDs | NCDMV.
- 6. Individuals who missed the regular voter registration deadline for their municipality's election may register and vote at the same time during the early voting period. Same-day registrants must attest to their eligibility and provide proof of where they live. For more information, visit <u>Register in Person During Early Voting</u>.
- 7. Voters who receive an absentee ballot by mail may deliver their completed ballot to an election official at an early voting site in their county during early voting hours. Ballots will be kept securely and delivered to the county board of elections for processing.
- 8. The State Board asks that all voters respect the rights of others to participate in the election. Every eligible voter is entitled to cast their ballot freely, without harassment or intimidation. Voters who feel harassed or intimidated should notify an election official immediately.

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- 9. Voters at one-stop early voting sites are entitled to the same assistance as voters at a voting place on Election Day. Curbside voting is available for eligible individuals at all early voting sites. For more information, visit Curbside Voting.
- 10. The State Board of Elections and county boards of elections do not generally provide information about candidates. However, candidates' websites, political parties, media outlets, and advocacy groups often compile information about candidates for voters.

Governor Cooper Launches NC S.A.F.E. Initiative to Promote Safe Gun Storage

Today, Governor Roy Cooper announced the NC S.A.F.E. (Secure All Firearms Effectively) initiative to urge North Carolinians to take action to safely store their firearms and save lives.

Today, Governor Roy Cooper announced the NC S.A.F.E. (Secure All Firearms Effectively) initiative to urge North Carolinians to take action to safely store their firearms and save lives. This call to action highlights firearm safety in response to mounting numbers of deaths of children and youth from firearm injury, along with a surge in firearm thefts across the state.

"For those of us who own guns, it's our responsibility to keep them safe and out of the wrong hands," said Governor Cooper. "Safe storage is an essential part of responsible gun ownership, and this initiative will encourage North Carolinians to safely secure their firearms in their homes and vehicles."

There is an urgent need for North Carolinians to safely secure their firearms in order to decrease childhood deaths, decrease firearm thefts, and increase the safety of homes and communities. The NC S.A.F.E. (Secure All Firearms Effectively) is a new statewide initiative that provides resources on best practices for firearm storage and safety. NC S.A.F.E. is not associated with any advocacy-based initiatives related to gun laws or regulations.

"Children are gaining access to firearms in their homes, and gun theft — especially from cars — is on the rise throughout North Carolina," said NC Department of Public Safety Deputy Secretary William Lassiter. "Today, more than 20% of youth car break-ins involve guns. That's double what we've seen in recent years. We all have to work together to stop guns from getting into the wrong hands."

"Too many of our children are dying from gun violence, and it simply does not have to be this way," said Attorney General Josh Stein. "If you own a gun or are thinking of buying one, lock it up and keep it secured so it's not stolen or lost. Our children's lives may depend on it."

The NC S.A.F.E. initiative is part of Governor Cooper's ongoing commitment to reducing violence and strengthening public safety in North Carolina. In March 2023, the Governor announced the creation of a statewide <u>Office of Violence Prevention</u> focused on reducing violence and firearm misuse in North Carolina. In 2019, the Governor <u>directed</u> state agencies to close crime reporting gaps between state and federal agencies. The Governor's budget proposal includes investments in school and community safety, including the Office of Violence Prevention.

Firearms are the <u>leading cause of injury-related death among children and youth</u> in North Carolina. Last year, a Johnston County <u>2-year-old died</u> from a single gunshot wound to the head after finding his father's loaded handgun in the front seat of the family's truck. In April, a 7-year-old in Robeson County died while visiting a family member after the child found a loaded gun inside the residence. Nationwide, an estimated <u>82% of adolescent suicides by firearm involve</u> a gun belonging to a family member.

Gun thefts have increased across North Carolina. In <u>Raleigh</u>, 211 firearms were stolen from vehicles in 2020. In Durham, 62% of the approximately 185 gun thefts from cars in 2022 were from unlocked cars — meaning these were preventable crimes. According to a 2021 Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System survey, more than half of the firearms that were stored loaded at home—already a safety risk--were also unlocked.

Gun owners in North Carolina can prevent firearm injuries and deaths as well as gun theft through safe storage. There are many ways to effectively secure a gun, including cable locks, trigger locks, gun safes, lockboxes, and gun cases. To secure guns in vehicles, NC S.A.F.E. urges gun owners to both lock their vehicle and safely secure the firearm with a locking device.

Governor Cooper has <u>proclaimed</u> June 4-10 as NC S.A.F.E. Week of Action to raise awareness about the importance of safe gun storage. As part of this week, representatives of the North Carolina Department of Public Safety will be traveling across the state to spread this message along with local law enforcement, juvenile justice and other partners in public safety. In addition, NC S.A.F.E. will be encouraging all North Carolinians to secure their firearms effectively and to insist others do in their communities to save lives.


