

#### **The PSA for HIM ACT – HR 1826**



#### American Cancer Society Racial disparities in prostate cancer could be addressed with newly introduced legislation

On September 14, 2023 – Bipartisan legislation that would eliminate financial barriers to prostate cancer

screening was introduced in the U.S. Senate. **Sponsored by Sens. Cory Booker (D-NJ) and John Boozman (R-AR),** the **Prostate-Specific Antigen Screening for High-risk Insured Men (PSA Screening for HIM) Act** would waive cost-sharing requirements for men with the highest risk of prostate cancer, focusing on Black men and those with a family history of the disease.

**Prostate cancer is the second most common type of cancer in American men.** However, while cancer affects everyone, it does not affect everyone equally. Black men have a much higher incidence of prostate cancer compared to other men. **In fact, one in six Black men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer, which is a 70% higher incidence rate than in White men.** 

We're advocating for the **Prostate-Specific Antigen Screening for High-risk Insured Men Act or the PSA Screening for HIM Act,** legislation that would require private health insurance plans to cover prostate cancer screenings for those at high risk of the disease, with no out-of-pocket costs for patients. PSA screenings can often detect prostate cancer before signs and symptoms are present, at earlier stages when the disease is easier to treat. <u>Early detection saves lives</u>, and can help decrease death rates for everyone.



#### Fostering the Principles of Kwanzaa: Focusing on Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics)

As we enter the holiday season, let's revisit a popular African American tradition called Kwanzaa. There are seven principles of Kwanzaa. They are:

 Umoja (Unity)
Kujichagulia (Self-Determination)
Ujima (Collective Work and Responsibility)
Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics)
Nia (Purpose)
Kuumba (Creativity)
Imani (Faith)



While each principle has its own significance, we will focus on a discussion of <u>Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics</u>) For sake of simplicity, this will be a discussion about capitalism as utilized as an economic tool for the prosperity of African Americans and others of African descent.



**Economic prosperity for African** Americans or the tendency for lower socioeconomic status for African Americans must be understood against the backdrop of history. While not all African Americans are poor,

we are disproportionately so. In fact, we don't have the cooperation across the **Diaspora** that is necessary to improve our socioeconomic status.

Additionally, much of the economic benefits of global trade have historically gone to European nations throughout the past eras of imperialism and colonialism. And much of the scholarly discussion on trade focuses on Europe as the center of that trade. Since the thought behind global trade centers on Europe, Africa and its **Diaspora** fails to place itself at the center of thought in terms of having its people benefit from said trade. It is notable that Africa is resource rich,

The impact of racism has also worked to keep African Americans and others of African descent from cooperating on the scale necessary to bring about globally comparable wealth to Europeans. According to nonprofit quarterly.org,

**"The US has** a long and bloody history of racial terrorism targeting Black-owned businesses. This history includes the racist pogrom that destroyed Tulsa's 'Black Wall Street' in 1921."



**Riot's Devastation** 

African American people don't lack economic thought. Since the end of slavery, there have been attempts at economic advancement for African Americans. For example, Booker T. Washington's book "Up from Slavery" emphasized the need for industrial training to take advantage of the then new employment opportunities that would be brought about by the developments of the Industrial Revolution.

Still, socioeconomic progress for African Americans has been impeded, historically by racism.

In addition to acts such as racist pogroms, economically successful African Americans could face lynching and other forms of racial violence for being successful.



Still, there have been some very successful efforts by African Americans to advance our socioeconomic status. For example, Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU's) have been instrumental in improving the socioeconomic conditions of many African Americans despite racism. Unfortunately, still, today, too many times African Americans are consumers, but not creditors. There still must be a serious effort



towards financing our own entrepreneurs. More essentially, we need to have faith in our entrepreneurs. Many ideas have died, in the post-Civil Rights era, because we haven't worked to help our

entrepreneurs to raise the capital needed for their startups. Again, this is a failure to think in terms of scale. More specifically, we need to have the attitude that we will rebuild when faced with any setbacks.

In addition to this, it must be understood that not all government assistance is "welfare." In fact, the existence of White suburban communities post-WWII, and throughout the latter half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, were financed through government assistance. Also, land grant colleges that educated many Americans were provided through government assistance.

In the same way, the government enforced African American poverty through redlining and other such acts, that concentrated African Americans residentially in poor, urban communities, also known as ghettos. The "ghettoization" of African Americans continued throughout the 1980's and 1990's, and its effect can still be felt today. The solution here is for us as people of African descent to think on a larger, global scale when it comes to business and economics. It is not enough to have political power. The point here is that one's socioeconomic decline begins once you are placed in a ghetto. The ghetto stops you from gaining access to the resources that would be available if given access to a larger market.



This is why people should travel. Being able to see the world and experience its various, rich cultures can serve as an antidote to ignorance and prejudice.

Admittedly, ignorance knows no color, and experience can

be a powerful teacher. For example, Malcolm X was a staunch Black nationalist until he made his trip to Mecca and Africa. I'm convinced that if African Americans knew more Haitians, and more continental Africans, and more about those cultures, then we would all see our common plight and hence, cooperate.


