"Voices from the Past" Brings History to Life

On Saturday, April 6 from 11 A.M. to 3 P.M., League members and the public are invited to the sixth annual "Voices from the Past"-a unique living history event that tells the stories of Charlotte's founding fathers, civic leaders, pioneering women, and a few interesting characters. Guests are invited to take a "spirited stroll" through Charlotte's historic cemeteries—Elmwood, Pinewood and Old Settlers'—and interact with portrayers as they tell the stories of the men and women who helped make Charlotte what it is today. The LWVCM is a cosponsor of the event. Our own Suzanne Elsberry, League President will represent the League in the reenactment with Gladys Love Avery Tillett (b. 1892d. 1984), an activist, the first President of the LWVCM and eventually a LWVNC President years later. Elsberry's interaction with Mrs.

Tillett, who will be portrayed by local veterinarian Dr. Katie Wolfe, will be a full circle moment as Elsberry escorted Tillett to Raleigh on February 28, 1973 to lobby the NC Senate to pass the ERA. The bill was defeated 27-23 when some senators switched their votes at the last minute.

"Surprisingly," remarked Elsberry who never shies away from a presentation or performance, "I will not be the one in costume at this event!"

what is in store by watching a clip of the organizers as they appeared on WBTV On Your Side. Lynn Mintzer, founder of "Voices from the Past" characterizes the event as telling the history of Charlotte by getting beyond the tombstone. As you look at tombstones, you see the name, birth and death dates. "We focus on the dash," says Mintzer, "which is their life story."

Environment Team to Visit the Innovation Barn

The Environment + Sustainability Team is scheduled to visit the Innovation Barn to learn about developing a circular economy-how recyclables can be turned into useful articles and products. The Innovation Barn is a joint project between the City of Charlotte and Envision Charlotte. As part of their tour, the E+S Team will experience and explore the inner workings of circular and sustainable initiatives such as: Aquaponics vertical farming (featuring a submarine aquarium/tank filled with tilapia), Plastics Lab (where plastic is shredded, melted, and remolded), Glass Crushing Center (turning glass bottles into crushed glass cullet and silica sand), Textile Diversion (through clothing repair, redesign and repurposing), Composting with Crown Town Compost (complete with a black soldier fly + worm composting room!), Southern Spore Work's mushroom grow container, Change Please (a non-profit cafe working to combat homelessness)....and more!

At their organizational meeting, the team decided to set their monthly meetings for the fourth Thursday of each month at 1pm via Zoom. Dates thru June are <u>now listed</u>.

LWVCM + YWCA Host Healthcare Justice Event

According to Mental Health America, almost 40% of caregivers identify as Black, Indigenous, or People of Color (BIPOC). Within each BIPOC racial/ethnic group, the **rates of caregiving are higher** than in white demographics. This year's "Until Justice Just Is" community panel and discussion will focus on caregiving in communities of color, the relevant cultural context associated with this practice and the necessity for radical change when it comes to the supportive services of both caretaker and those being cared for. It truly takes a village to not only care for a child but also the lives of those who may be experiencing short-term or long term limitations within our communities (Johns Hopkins Medicine).

In a recent VOTER. I expressed gratitude to our wonderful **members**, both longstanding and new for their loyalty and support for the League of Women Voters Charlotte Mecklenburg. It goes without saying that minus our members, our organization would cease to exist. This month LWVCM recognizes and thanks our **volunteers** who enable us to fulfill our mission of empowering voters and defending democracy. League volunteers show invaluable dedication and generosity as they contribute their time, expertise, enthusiasm and treasure to guarantee our success as an organization. I salute you, one and all!

League members spent a busy March with activities involving our many programs. On March 19, Corrie Moore, Senior Director of Philanthropy for Planned Parenthood (South Atlantic Region) spoke to our members about reproductive health care and its challenges in our current environment. Attendees posed many questions and observations to Corrie during the lively Q&A following her talk.

The newly formed **BKDs group** (Be, Know, Do) of senior members enjoyed their first outing as they toured the Charlotte History Museum on April 25. The group plans a luncheon for April 25 in the Library Conference Room at Myers Park Baptist Church as their next activity.

Also in March, LWVCM Board members and guests enjoyed the play "The Thursday Night Bridge Circle" written by NC playwright, Ray Kennedy. Set in a small southern town, the play offers a thoughtful look at the traditions of racial discrimination peppered with comedic southern witticism reminiscent of the movies "Steel Magnolias" and "The Help." DEI Chair, Linda Traum arranged the event as a part of LWVCM's **DEI** learning experiences.

At our invitation, Dr. Crystal Hill, (CMS Superintendent) met virtually with members of the **Education Team** to answer questions regarding priorities in public school funding and staffing. The meeting helped direct the future advocacy efforts and focus of this energetic team.

Members of the LWVCM Board have been attending workshops sponsored by the Executive Services Corporation (a non-profit organization advising non-profits) for the past several weeks. Thus far, workshops led by executive level volunteers have offered comprehensive learning sessions in the areas of board development: Cohesive Boards, Harnessing Human Capital-the upcoming session will focus on Financial Management.

Our Archives Coordinator, Margaret Howe-Soper, has reenergized our **Environmental and Sustainability Action Team.** Their first activity is slated for April with a guided tour of the **Innovation Barn** on Seigle Avenue. A model for a circular economy, this sustainability initiative innovates ways to transform trash into treasure. Charlotte is the first U.S. city to launch such a program which strives to make waste a thing of the past by making it useful.

Speaking of reviving Action Teams, we are searching for a volunteer(s) to lead our **Women's Issues team.** A significant number of our new members have indicated an interest in Women's Issues, which include Economic and Political Equality as well as Reproductive Rights. A Women's Issues Team advocates for these rights which are so critically important considering the current challenging environment. Please consider taking a leading role in helping raise our chapter's voice for the passage of the ERA and restoring our reproductive freedoms.

Kudos and congratulations to 2nd V.P. and Civics 101 Team Leader, Jane Hoffmann, for the stellar session of the Civics 101 program which just completed. Jane and her amazing and dedicated team have scored another hit that not only garnered new members to LWVCM, but attracted much positive media attention!

LWVCM is a sponsor for **Voices From the Past** event being held on Saturday, April 6 at Elmwood, Old Settlers' and Pinewood Cemeteries from 11:00 A.M.-3:00 P.M. As the current President, I am looking forward to introducing the costumed portrayer of **our first LWVCM President, Gladys Tillet**. Mrs. Tillet was a renowned advocate for voting rights, civil rights and women's rights as well as a national political leader. I had the honor to meet our first League President in 1973 as I drove her to Raleigh to lobby senators for the ERA. The event, organized by the Mecklenburg Historic Association allows us to hear the stories of 33 of the memorable Mecklenburg citizens buried in the cemeteries. I hope you will plan to attend this unique event!

A final comment: With scores of the ballots certified by the NCSBE on March 26, the turnout in Mecklenburg's **March 5 Primary Election** was disappointing—a mere 19% of voters. Mecklenburg was 97th in voter turnout out of NC's 100 counties. Obviously, LWVCM has a big challenge to overcome for the General Election in November. So, let's resolve to redouble our efforts this fall and GOTV!

Civics 101's Final Session of 2024 Makes News

That's a wrap! The League of Women Voters of Charlotte Mecklenburg once again hosted its hybrid "Civics 101" program—a series of six sessions for the citizens of Mecklenburg County. These educational classes covered voting; city, town, and county governments; CMS and the Board of Education; the county court system; and media literacy. Participants heard from current and former office holders, civil servants, and local reporters to gain an in-depth knowledge of the workings of their local government. Thanks to a generous donor, the 2024 program was free of charge for participants.

The final session featured a panel discussion by journalists from the Charlotte area–Ann Doss Helms (WFAE); Herb White (Charlotte Post); Diego Barahona (La Noticia); Joe Bruno (WSOC-TV); and Alexandria Sands (Axios). The discussion was moderated by J. Israel Balderas, who currently serves as assistant professor of journalism at Elon University, where he specializes in Media Law and Ethics. Professor Balderas kicked off the session with a compelling keynote presentation "Journalism at a Crossroads: Protecting Democratic Values in a Rapidly Evolving Al World."

At the close of the evening (and program), the League held a ceremony wherein those who attended in person re-

ceived Certificates of Completion and cake! 13-year-old participant, Adhvik Pradeep, was the youngest Civics 101 participant to date and engaged with all six sessions.

You Are Nature's Best Hope

Many of us diligently "reduce, reuse, recycle" and even upcycle and still wish we could do more to help the environment. By the end of the century, up to 40% of the insect species may go extinct owing in part to habitat loss. Why does that matter? Insects help maintain healthy soil, recycle nutrients, pollinate flowers and crops and control pests. Without them,

our ecology will be out of balance. Entomologist Doug Tallamy and his organization, Homegrown National Park, are calling on us to help to increase biodi-

versity by planting native plants in our yards while decreasing the sizes of our grass areas. A plant is considered native if it has occurred in an area without human introduction. These plants have co-evolved with insects to be their food source and habitat. Maintaining grass lawns increases greenhouse gasses, pollutes ecosystems, wastes water and diminishes biodiversity. By planting native species in our yards and containers we can make a difference, one person at a time! —Lucy Kempton

BKDs Get a Guided Tour of the Charlotte History Museum and 1774 Hezekiah Alexander House

Did you know that the Charlotte History Museum has the original desk and a hand-written (recently discovered) letter of Hezekiah Alexander? Did you know that in the 1700s one form of tea was small compacted bricks, impressed with the maker's symbol from which the drinker cut a piece to put into hot water? Did you know that Alexander briefly imprisoned Tories in the third floor attic of his rock house on the Museum property?

These and other revelations about the museum's Hezekiah Alexander house, the oldest standing rock house left in Mecklenburg County, with the largest ground level seven-ton "Freedom" bell in the US impressed League members of the BKD group touring the grounds. (BKDs are LWVCM members over 60 that Be, Know and Do.)

Fourteen women and men participated in the first "field trip" of the new League group, getting to know one another and learning a lot of Mecklenburg history in the process. Members attending decided that the next event would be strictly social with a covered dish brunch on April 25 at the League office.
