Environment Team Meetings in the New Year

Join members of the LWVCM Environment committee whose thoughts will have moved from the election and holidays to <u>Spring Gardens</u> and new beginnings for 2025. With those thoughts in mind, the team will be

meeting on January 16 at 10am (hybrid) to learn about gardening with plants native to North Carolina or what he calls Ecological Gardening.



Daniel Jakobovits,

a consultant and landscape designer for Eco Backyards, LLC, a habitat construction, eco-

logical landscape design and install company from Matthews will address the group. Daniel has made his passion for the environment into a vocation. He has worked to improve our planet for 27 years with everyone that would listen. He is a member of HAWK, the Matthews chapter of NC Wildlife

Federation, and a volunteer with TreesCharlotte and Creek Releaf. Daniel holds a B.S. in Environmental Science from UNCW, is an Accredited Organic Landscaper and Certified Habitat Steward.

Then on February 20 at 10am (hybrid) members will be introduced to a new way of thinking about the food we eat and its impact on the climate in a talk called the <u>Food-Climate</u> <u>Nexus</u> by Ted Volskay.



Ted currently hails from Greenville, SC and is a US Navy veteran. Professionally, Ted has been involved with environmental consulting for more than 30 years especially in the areas of water contamination clean-up at several Air Force bases, remediation of soil and groundwater contaminated by PFAS (forever chemicals), and legal compliance with various federal/state environmental acts. He holds degrees in chemistry (U. of South FL 1981), environmental systems engineering (Clemson University 1988) as well as anticipating graduating in sustainable water management (U. of S. FL, May 2025). Ted was been a member of the Greenville, SC LWV for 29 years and is currently a member of the LWV of Henderson, NC.

Empowering Democracy with Civics 101

The League of Women Voters of Charlotte Mecklenburg is proud to announce the return of our signature Civics 101 program, beginning February 19, 2025. This series continues to be an invaluable resource for educating Mecklenburg County residents about the inner workings of local government.

This year marks an exciting expansion of the program, which has grown from six weeks to seven to include a dedicated session on North Carolina state government. With critical decisions and policies emerging from Raleigh, program planners deem it essential for participants to gain a deeper understanding of the state's role in shaping local governance.

Civics 101 offers participants an in-depth exploration of local governance through engaging presentations, Q&A sessions, and interactive elements like polls and quizzes. This year's lineup covers key topics, including the Mecklenburg County Board of Elections, City and County Government, NC Courts, CMS Board of Education, State Government, and the role of local media. Each session features experts from these fields, providing attendees with firsthand insights and actionable knowledge.

The program's impact is undeniable. Many participants have gone on to take active roles in government and civic life, from serving on boards to holding elected office. Their journeys began with the foundational understanding gained from this program, demonstrating its power to inspire informed and engaged citizens.

Civics 101 offers both in-person and virtual options, expanding accessibility and participation. However, the League strongly encourages attendees to join us in person to fully benefit from networking opportunities with peers and guest speakers.

Many thanks to the dedicated League members whose efforts in planning, organizing, and presenting Civics 101 make this program possible. The team's commitment ensures the League lives its mission of empowering informed and active citizens. This flagship program aims to not just educating the community—but inspire the next generation of civic leaders.

DEMOCRACY IS NOT A SPECTATOR SPORT

A Bad Moon Arsing Over Raleigh

On December 9, 2025, a Moral Monday march drew a passionate crowd of activists, faith leaders, and concerned citizens to Raleigh. The march, led by the indomitable Bishop William J. Barber II, Reverend Rodney Sadler, and other prominent voices for justice, served as a rallying cry against systemic inequities and a call for accountability within state government.

The timing of the march was significant, as it came just before the North Carolina General Assembly was set to vote on overriding Governor Roy Cooper's veto of <u>Senate</u> <u>Bill 382</u>. The bill has sparked widespread condemnation for essentially undermining the voices and votes of North Carolinians. Bishop Barber and others have called it a power grab masquerading as a hurricane relief bill.

The march began in the early evening when protesters gathered before the legislative building, their chants protest songs ringing out. Signs demanding equitable redistricting, voting rights protections, and transparency in governance lined the streets, painting a vivid picture of civic engagement. Bishop Barber addressed the crowd with his signature blend of fiery rhetoric and moral clarity, reminding attendees of the power of collective action. "We stand here

united against the forces that seek to divide us," Barber proclaimed. "Together, we will rise, resist, and rebuild a democracy that works for all." Reverend Sadler emphasized the importance of persistence in the face of adversity. "This march is not the end," he said. "It is a beginning. Each step we take tonight is a step toward justice, equity, and a future where every voice is heard."

Harry Taylor, reflecting on the event, captured the gravity of the moment with a metaphor. "There's a bad moon arising over our state," he said, "but perhaps, together, we can shoot it down." These words from a man who as campaigned for decades against gerrymandering and other threats to democratic principles.

The Moral Monday movement continues to serve as a beacon of hope and a testament to the enduring power of grassroots activism. With leaders like Bishop Barber, Reverend Sadler, and committed citizens like Harry Taylor and the Charlotte protest crew, the fight for justice in North Carolina remains unyielding.

LWVCM Presidents' Perspective



After months of arduous work dedicated to preparing, the general election is finally behind us. As we move forward into the holiday season and a new year, we would like to take a moment to express sincere appreciation to our amazing volunteers for their dedication and hard work in ensuring our citizens were registered and encouraged to vote, educated about the new voting laws and candidates' stances.

Our focus and efforts were targeted on the election and understandably many of our other efforts were curtailed. In the months ahead, we plan to return to a normal pace, dividing our efforts among our many worthwhile programs. For example, many of you have heard of the 50-year "Moonshot" project in which LWVUS plans to work towards the elimination of the Electoral College which virtually eliminates the voice of millions of our citizens living in the most populous states by awarding Electoral votes on an unfair basis. The few battleground states receive all the attention from candidates and statistics show that these states are also favored with financial legislation. Winners of the NPV would instead be determined by millions of real votes versus the paltry few currently cast.

As a first step to address this inequity, and one that does not require a constitutional amendment, the League supports the enactment of the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact (NPV). The NPV will become law with sufficient states signing on to equal 270 Electoral Votes. Each state will cast all their electoral votes for the winner of the popular vote resulting in the election of the President and Vice President with the **most votes** nationally. Currently, 17 states have committed to the NPV equaling 209 electoral votes. The League will continue to advocate and pressure for the remaining votes to make this the law of the land. Surveys reveal that Americans favor the NPV or, one person one vote, by about 2 to 1.

LWV Membership Updates: What You Need to Know

The LWVUS is transitioning to a nationwide member portal that will handle all join and renew functions. The date all Leagues will transition is 2/1/2025. No action is needed now, but here is what to expect:

- **Renewals:** Continue renewing as usual this year. Starting January 2025, you'll receive an email to access the new portal, where you can login and update your contact information. The LWV Charlotte Mecklenburg will add a join/renew button on our website that will take you to the new portal. Membership will last one year from your most recent renewal date, and you'll have the option to set up annual auto-renewal.
- Dues: Dues will transition to a pay-what-you-can model, with a minimum of \$20 and a recommended amount of \$75. This approach supports inclusivity while sustaining League activities. Note that contributions above your \$75 renewal fee will primarily be sent to the National and State treasuries, not exclusively your local League. We humbly suggest you make any donations SEPARATE from your dues to your local League. (To note: Our League is one of very few chapters nationwide for which this change in dues structure will put a strain on our programming budget. Please consider easing this transition with a donation in any amount to our <u>Winter Fundraiser</u>.)
- **Renewal Reminders**: Email reminders will guide you through the process, and for those not using the internet, renewing by check will remain an option.

This change is designed to simplify membership management for individuals while growing our national membership base, enhancing our ability to empower voters and defend democracy. We'll keep you updated as new information becomes available.

Voter Service Team Hosts Ice Cream Social

On November 13, the Voter Service Team held a Volunteer Appreciation party at the Myers Park Baptist Church Library for the legion volunteers who worked tirelessly for the many months leading up to and through the 2024 Primary and General Elections.



Volunteers were treated to ice cream with all the fixings served up by Co-President Suzanne Elsberry. Voter Service Chair and Co-President Linda Traum recounted the team's impressive statistics on the numbers of voters reached

through postcarding, distributing door hangers, text banking, and of course through the League's many voter registration and engagement opportunities all over the county.

League member and former mayor Jennifer Roberts was among those in attendance and noted the League's impactful partnership with the NC Trusted Elections Tour that helped engage voters across the state providing essential information about voting laws and procedures.



LWVCM Education Team Update

As part of the Education Team's goal of educating the public about the importance of public schools, Jeanne Smith and Carol Gray Adler presented at the recent Women in Business Conference sponsored by the Cabarrus County Chamber of Commerce. The conference was attended by close to 200 women leaders. Many participants were interested in learning more about the importance of public schools on the economy of Cabarrus county. Some were unaware of the low level of state funding for public schools and its impact on student achievement and on filling the more than 3,000 teacher vacancies across the state this fall.

In addition to advocating for increased funding for public schools, the Education Action Team has consistently opposed the expansion of the Opportunity Scholarship Program, the program that provides vouchers to parents who want to send their children to private schools. Earlier this fall, the General Assembly (NCGA) agreed to fund a big expansion of the program to ensure that all of the parents who applied-no matter what the level of family income-would receive a voucher. This expansion which was part of HB 10 was vetoed by Governor Roy Cooper. The Education Team anticipated that the NCGA might vote to override Governor Cooper's veto when they returned to meet after the General Election. The Education Team prepared a detailed Action Alert that was adopted by the state LWV. All LWVNC members were urged to communicate with targeted representatives whose rural districts will lose funding for their public schools and whose constituents are unlikely to benefit from the vouchers as there are few private schools in the districts.

In spite of our efforts, the veto was overridden and an additional \$463 million dollars was allocated for the program's expansion. This funded the applicants on the waitlist, which contained more than 70% of families that were ineligible under previous income caps (earning above \$115,000/ year for a family of 4). It will cost ~\$5 billion for the next 10 years to fund applicants from these wealthier families.

This is money needed for the chronically underfunded public schools. The Education Team will continue to monitor the impact of the Opportunity Scholarship Program on state funding of public schools in order to inform our advocacy and our efforts to build support for public schools.

BOCC 2025 Legislative Priorities and Calendar

On December 10, during the Budget Policy Workshop, the Mecklenburg County Board of County Commissioners voted to adopt the <u>2025 Mecklenburg County Proposed Legis-</u> <u>lative Agenda.</u> Priorities include Educational Attainment, Environmental Stewardship, Health Access, Housing Insecurity, Workforce Development, Justice and Public Safety, Tax & Finance, and Transportation.
