## **Teacher Licensure Update**

North Carolina will maintain its current passing scores for teacher licensure exams, opting not to raise the required cut scores on the edTPA assessments. The decision comes amid ongoing concerns about teacher shortages across the state and the potential impact of higher test standards on the educator pipeline.

State education officials determined that increasing the passing scores, though aligned with recommendations from the test provider, would likely reduce the number of candidates earning licensure without significantly improving teacher effectiveness. The decision was supported by both the Department of Public Instruction and the Professional Educator Preparation and Standards Commission, which advises the State Board of Education.

North Carolina's current cut score of 38 falls in the mid-range compared to other states—higher than in several states but lower than in others. The decision to maintain the existing score was made unanimously by the State Board of Education.

## Senate Bill 124 - State Hiring Accessibility and Modernization

A new law in North Carolina aims to reduce hiring delays and fill long-standing vacancies in state government jobs. The legislation directs the State Human Resources Commission to review job qualifications and expand roles that do not require a four-year degree, making it easier for individuals with military backgrounds or trade certifications to apply. The bill also allows agencies to expedite hiring by reusing qualified candidate pools, transitioning temporary workers into permanent roles, and offering greater flexibility in setting salaries and providing hiring or retention bonuses for hard-to-fill positions.

The positive aspects of this bill opens the door to more North Carolinians by valuing real-world experience and skills over unnecessary degree requirements. It helps streamline the hiring process, fills critical vacancies faster, and ensures that state government can better serve our communities with a strong, diverse, and capable workforce. This legislation is a step toward creating a more inclusive, efficient, and opportunity-rich public sector.
