Abre' Conner, the NAACP's director of environmental and climate justice, hosted a panel on renewable energy solutions. She said that cutting carbon pollution at home — whether that's through energy-saving retrofits, installing residential solar or even purchasing an electric vehicle — could help communities who are often on the frontlines of extreme weather: "This is one of the ways that we ensure that our communities do not continue to experience as frequent and severe climate-related disasters," Conner said.


